

CORE CURRICULUM – 2005-2006 OR BEFORE

Every student at Concordia is required to take a body of courses known as the Core Curriculum to provide a solid foundation in the liberal arts. The chart below indicates the requirements and all applicable courses. Please review the departmental listings for courses offered this semester. **(Courses cannot be taken pass/fail to satisfy Core requirements.)**

<p><b>1. PRINCIPIA:</b> This course provides a common intellectual experience that nurtures an understanding of the outcomes of a liberal arts education.</p>	Principia 101

<p><b>4. DISTRIBUTION COURSES:</b> To satisfy this requirement, at least seven courses must be chosen from the five areas listed below, including at least one course from each area but no more than two from any area. With the exception of language courses, no more than one course from any department can be counted in one distribution area. The distribution courses are listed, by area, in each class schedule. Distribution courses taken in excess of the requirements are applicable as electives. (College Catalog) One course from your major may apply to A-E.</p>

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**6. MATHEMATICS PROFICIENCY:** This can be satisfied by either a quantitative ACT at the 50 percentile or above at time of admission; passing the mathematics proficiency examination before graduation; or passing one of the applicable courses — course numbers followed by a “K”.
